


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

Featured on the front page is a copy of one of nine prize cards found in the garden shed which used to be part of what is commonly known as the Morrow property, no.16 Wychwood Park. The cards which range form First to Third Prizes and won from 1911 - 1914 were discovered during the demolition of the shed in May of 1988.

Ernest E.A. DuVernet and his wife Julia were the original owners of the Eden Smith and Son designed house. Construction of three new houses was started in May of this year on the site where the garden used to be. The garden continued to be maintained by Mrs. Morrow until her death in 1985. Many of the plants were rescued before the construction began and can now be found in many gardens throughout the Park.

WYCHWOOD PARK 1888-1988

On April 10, 1988 an exhibition of art and photography was held at 96 Wychwood Park. The exhibition entitled The Joy of Wychwood was a celebration of the original plan of subdivision of the Park (no.854) and "to get together with present & past neighbours to share an appreciation of our present & past neighbourhood."


The amount of effort to piece this exhibition together was enormous. The research and search for art, photographs and historical material was exhaustive and exhausting. The idea which had been started in October of 1987 was completed only 20 minutes before the doors opened!


In February 1988 a commitment was made to have at least 30 paintings. On April 10 more than 200 guests were able to see 65 paintings, 17 of which were by Marmaduke Matthews. Many of these were of the Park.

A vast array of photographs, files, books, bottles etc were also on display. The enthusiasm of the moment meant that most of the paintings remained up for viewing for the entire week. It was very rewarding to have some people pay return visits. By the week's end well over 250 people had enjoyed The Joy of Wychwood.

The Archives would like to thank Albert & Emily Fulton for opening, sharing and upsetting their house, April 10 - 17, 1988, and making the event a resounding success.

Credit for the success of the exhibition must also be shared with the countless individuals who lent or donated material. It was their generosity which made the endeavour possible.

The two of ice cutting on the pond were rephotographed from the small originals & enlarged for your enjoyment of our past.


